President's Report

E hao kit e taonga pounamu (seek the revered treasure)

Due to the resignation of our President John Munro in the latter part of the season I was fortunate to represent SBOP in the new role of President. It has been a huge learning curve for me and I acknowledge those individuals for being on hand with lots of much needed advice. I hope to use the knowledge gained in the best interest of swimming in our region.

Swimming Bay of Plenty is committed to our swimmers and our role is to make our swimmers dreams become reality. It is our desire – our fire. Our job is to inspire them with new ideas and to give them some direction. Their dreams are our motivation.

Swimming Bay of Plenty is delighted to report that 149 of our competitive swimmers swam at SNZ National Competitions/Championships and attained 73 podium finishes. It is pleasing to see our membership numbers continue to grow and we have had a 20% increase over the past five years. However, it is alarming that our competitive swimmers continue to decline. 33.45% decrease over the past five years. A simple way to review that is to ask three questions:

- What are we doing that we should **keep doing?** Or **what is working?**
- What are we doing that we should **stop doing?** Or what is **not working?**
- What are we not doing that we could introduce to **improve** our performance? Or what are some **new things** we can do that **will work.**

We need to understand the real issues and identify simple and effective ways of making important changes – quickly and effectively. With a little effort, a lot of creativity and some passion to make it work, we can have an outstanding season. Our calendar should be:

- **FAST** – create an environment where swimmers want to compete and race fast
- **FAMILY ORIENTATED** – embrace families like they are part of swimming
- **FUN FUN FUN**

We thank our Coaches. Coaching is a tough business. Early mornings, long weekends, late evenings writing programs and developing coaching strategies. Coaches are passionate souls who enjoy the involvement in our great sport of swimming.

Swimming Bay of Plenty would not be without the hundreds of hours of work performed by volunteers. We continually improve the running of the meets – in fact; we now have major SNZ events to showcase swimming to our communities. So much progress has been made in organizing and running swim meets. We have grown stronger through the efforts of local volunteers; we could not function without them. Every Club has at least one or more persons who always step forward to help wherever needed. They are always there, dependable to do something for the good of the sport. I take this opportunity to say “thank you”.

A very special thanks to Karen Nixon, who kept the wheels oiled and turning far above the requirements of her job. Also to the “Wise Man” Norm Jeffs, who kept us on the correct path with his consistent reason and logic which are invaluable. What is impressive is Ron Armstrong, Lesley McKenzie, Chris Groothoff and Ann Benseman. With all their National responsibilities they still find

time to work local Club meets and interact with young swimmers and new officials. They are known for their dependability, knowledge of the rules, fairness and absolute integrity. I would like to thank Neville Hunter for the wonderful job he has done over the years with the Records. Fellow Board Members, I thank you for the robust discussions that allowed us to be transparent in our decisions. Most of the Board is prepared to stand again so we can consolidate on some of our plans and ideas. Maryanne has shown an unfailing commitment to the betterment of competitive swimming along with Arthur Faulkner, David McNamara and Brian Kendall; I am in awe of you all. Information and innovations are constantly being thrown up to challenge you and you are just ready to make it work. It is with deep regret that Geraldine Hale has now retired. Geraldine has been a stalwart of swimming and has held many positions at Club and Board level. Her contribution has been incalculable and will be greatly missed.

One of the biggest hurdles is communication. This year we have put a lot of effort into improving the vital link between clubs, region and SNZ. In all our major undertakings, consultation with Clubs and SNZ has been a large part of the process. The website is our flagship and our face to the world. We need an individual to help to ensure the website is updated and information on events and issues is available. It is an excellent facility and I believe that communication can be improved in a very important way by ensuring that members can be informed about everything through our website.

Over the past years we have worked hard to provide pathways for our athletes. An exciting project was the formation of the Three Region concept. This has exceeded everyone's expectations. This is an ongoing process and reviewed each year to make sure we are achieving our aims. As a result, the partnership between Taranaki, Waikato and BOP now includes HBPB. This has an enormous potential to raise the level of swimming and offer support for our coaches and swimmers. Clive Power has been retained as the Regional Director of Coaching. New initiatives have begun. After two years of increasing awareness on 12/u swimming through parent forums, emphasis on skill development and providing a more attractive competitive template, the 12/u will now become **Junior Development Programme 'JDP'**. While the emphasis and monitoring will still be placed on the senior programmes during the Regional Coaching Director's programme visits, two new initiatives will be implemented: **1.** Talent Identification and LTAD strategy. **2.** The provision of Coach Education for JDP.

A major task this year will be to address a growth strategy for SBOP. We need to investigate ways in which to increase upward movement from Club swimmers to Competitive swimmers.

Swimming Bay of Plenty is in good heart in spite of the challenges. Our challenge is to keep our sport growing. We must meet the needs of the members. We will be surveying members in the next year to find out what we can do to help and support our clubs.

In conclusion I am looking forward to another productive year. I have an excellent team who are able to look at the whole picture of swimming and thus move forward in a coordinated way. We are always open to ideas and welcome input from clubs, coaches and members. There is a lot still to do. On a more personal note, I am very excited, if not just a bit nervous, about taking on the role of President. I am looking forward to been part of an enthusiastic group and I am hopeful that I have something I am able to contribute to SBOP. The Board sets the strategic direction of swimming and it has been a pleasure to work with the membership over the past season. There will continue to be improvement as we move forward.

Regional Director of Coaching Report

#1 12/u Development

It was identified in 2008 that there was a real need in the regions to address the 12/u development area of our sport. Our numbers in the regions was showing the same trend as SNZ – declining numbers. There was a need to urgently reverse this trend if swimming in the regions was ever going to have a base big enough to start putting swimmers on the international scene.

The other area identified in our management of 12/u, was coaching; there was, in most coaching programmes, too much training of 12/u and not enough coaching of skills.

Since 2008 a great deal of work has been put into this part of the RCP in increasing awareness of the problem.

- Parent forums run during the Grand Prix series.
- Establishing black out periods in the regions calendars.
- Running workshops.
- Numerous written articles by the RDC.

There has been a small move to improve this area, but the changes have only gone so far without any real obvious commitment. This was confirmed by the response to the RDC request in September for coaches and regions to submit reports by October 31st 'to demonstrate strategies that were put in place to increase numbers over the winter period' The response was two reports from coaches and one from a region.

The RCD Report (November 2009) highlighted this lack of interest and set out three check lists that as a suggested guide to assist in the evaluation of the 12/u area in the regions.

I. Region Management.

- Dedicated working party to research the 12/u membership in the region
- Include this as a specific item in the strategic plan.
- Organise club meetings to increase awareness of the importance of 12/u development and retention.
- Do boards keep statistics on 12/u membership?

2a Coaching programmes – management

- Do you have a notice board
- Do you produce a regular newsletter.
- Do your parents fully understand your coaching philosophy and pathways.
- Do you have protocols in place for the coaching of 12/u's.

2b Coaching programmes – pool deck practice

- This section covered all the areas that were presented to all regions and coaches through newsletters, power point presentations and presented at the coach summit in the form of practical sessions (group management) and presentation on the coaching competencies for 12/u.

Subsequent to both these requests a further one went out to Regions by e-mail in February asking for numbers of participants at the Regional Junior Summer Meet – only one region responded.

#2 Regional Summer Championships

This year marked the 4th anniversary of the combined Three Regions Summer Championships hosted by Waikato. If there is one activity that I have taken a lot of satisfaction from the 3 Regions programme, it is that we (the 3 regions) were brave enough, had the support of administrators in our sport in the regions to make a change to a 100 year old template of Centre run summer championship.

We showed that we could be innovative and be prepared to change for the benefit of improving competitive opportunities for our swimmers. The new format was never to be set in stone but it was intended that at this Summit each year, we would review what we have achieved and where possible make changes to make it better.

I have promoted our summer regional Champs as one of the most significant changes to take place in NZ swimming at a region level for – I guess 100 years and I have been involved for 43 years so at least that time.

To my utter disappointment this year Waikato did not follow the format – many of the significant changes we put into the meet were not followed.

- No marshalling
- Protocol for night finals
- Announcing protocols.
- Officials – only one timer etc.

The blame is not to be aimed at this year's organisers totally; we must put procedures in place to make sure the meet follows exactly the format as decided by the 2010 Summit.

- A panel of experienced key officials (2) year to attend to the organizing of each years regional summer championships joined by officials of the host region who gain experience.
- The timing of the Championships needs to be reconsidered; it would allow coaches to utilize all the other regional championships throughout New Zealand.
- By placing the championships in February it would give swimmers valuable competition in a month there is little competition.

#3 Winter Grand Prix Series

The Winter Grand Prix Series was another competitive initiative 'to promote competitive opportunities in the 3 regions to replace the old worn out regional winter short course championships run by each individual region,

during the depths of winter – replace it with an exciting competitive and coaching opportunity and throw in a final for good measure – make our sport more appealing to this generation of swimmers.

Again to my utter disappointment I watched swimmers being coached to swim slow both in the individual regional meets and swimmers turning up to the final with a bag full of excuses backed up by coaches of why not to swim fast – excuses, excuses not a bit of hard arsed competitive guts in sight.

The format and structure of the Grand Prix was – having everyone from all regions attend the three meets to optimise our swimmer resource, full heats and competitive finals and for coaches to identify out of each meet an area of their swimmers performance that needed to be improved – coaching best practice. Over the intervening two weeks, work on any weaknesses – The winter is an ideal time to do this competitive technique coaching.

I wrote a short commentary in each of the regions Grand Prix programmes, pointing out some areas of weakness I had observed hoping this would help and even suggested that I should see video footage being taken to assist with your race analysis – I never saw any videos, in fact I never witnessed any change in coaching habits around the pool deck or listened into race debriefs or conversations that suggested any change in the delivery of the coaching practice.

Another concern I had, was the decision that a number of coaches had made not to attend the Taranaki leg of the series but rather attend the Auckland Champs

In my winter RCP Report (September 2009) I asked for each 650+ points coach to send me their analysis of their winter programmes performance. Two coaches replied. One section of that report asked coaches to establish what they had gained from attending the Auckland Champs over Taranaki and gave a breakdown on one event, the men's 200 free to illustrate how that analysis should be done. I did not get one reply answering that question.

I had trawled through the results and could not find any advantage or what I would consider benefits gained from going to Auckland. The format that was in place had been agreed at last years summit. You will need to decide on...

- What format you want the Three Regional Grand Prix series to take.
- If you want a final, points or any other system of scoring to make the meet competitive.
- Dates – weeks in between.
- Selections of a special squad of Aquaknights to dual meet another region?

Note:

It was commented to me that cost was a factor in not attending all three. I believe it was more about planning. If your winter programme is well planned and published at the start of the winter then parents have time to budget.

#4 PERFORMANCE

At last years summit I suggested that as a region we should take a collective approach to improving our performance standards suggesting a 'team approach'.

To achieve that initially, I suggested that we needed to put in place some form of testing / tracking of out of training and competitive performances. We discussed test sets and it was agreed that some sets would be trialed monthly through to December.

The responsibility of sending the sets to me was given to the swimmers. All they had to do was fill in the spaces on a XL template which worked out all the information I required. The result of this was extremely poor and after the first month I had only two responses.

Tracking in both training and competition is critical to having success in competition at any level. I gave examples last year of the tracking that I used for the Youth programme and I am using the same template for the PNZ programme at the moment.

All training should be modeled on the simple 'gap analysis' knowing where you are now and where you want to go and making sure that the performance gap in all competition is no more than 3% of your personal best, with the performance margin coming down to 2% - 1% closer to pinnacle events.

It goes back to my earlier comments in the competition section about providing the best competitive opportunities for the swimmers so that achieving that performance margin is made easier. What I see and hear are coaches instructing swimmers to swim slowly or the term 'swimming through the meet' defies all coaching best practice and will result in failure.

Our result at the national age groups (the Regional coaching programme is only an age group programme) was very poor. There was a couple of good results but remember one or two results do not reflect the health of a programme – I would have expected coaches to have analysed their Age group results before preparing the next annual plan.

The national average for personal bests at the age groups (2010) was Boys 45% females 39% overall was 42% dismal in it's self if a country wants to compete on the world stage. If your team did not achieve the national average then it is a fail mark.

Age group swimming should have a return of about 65% - 70% it is the minimum I would expect – it increases your medal potential.

As a regional coaching programme you are going to have to decide if you are prepared to work collectively to lift our/ your performances, by implementing training and competitive strategies and wanting to work with someone in a Regional Coaching position to assist in the process.

You decide.

- Are you prepared to work in a regional coaching programme?
- Do you want to be part of a collective team approach to improve the Regions competitive performance?
- Do we need tests sets or other monitoring systems?
- Do we need camps to work toward competitive success?

#5 THREE REGIONS EXECUTIVE

We have a new executive appointed with two representatives from each region. To this point there has not been the activity that I expected from this group. It was a big step in the programme to have the administration removed from the individual regions and placed in the hands of a separate management body. The executive has been formed for the sole purpose of liaising with the regions administration and implementing any changes that the coaches decide on that will promote better swimming in the regions, *the RCP is coach driven!*

Summary

It will appear to everyone in the 3 regions who are involved in anyway with the Regional coaching Programme that the areas that I have highlighted are repetitive 'we have heard it all before' and are all negative do not recognize some of the progress that has been made.

All the areas I have highlighted are repetitive, but each one is critical to the function and success of the Three Region Programme. There are a number of other tremendous initiatives waiting to be implemented it just needs the executive to re focus, a folder full of great coaching material that needs some motivated coaches to work together to improve the regions competitive performance.

As RDC I will not move one more step until each of these areas have been followed up on and consolidated and are functioning as they were intended.

It is in the hands of the Annual Coaches and Executives Summit to work on the areas of 12/u development, Three Regions Summer Championships, Winter Grand Prix, Performance and to have a functional relationship between the executive and coaches and come out with some very clear direction on how to reach a conclusion to each one of the key areas.

Club Liaison Officer's Report

This is my last report as a member of the Swimming Bay of Plenty Board as I am now stepping down. As I look back, I have seen changes in the way some clubs operate and consequently thrive, and others which persist in structures which are no longer relevant to their swimmers' requirements and are struggling to survive. Overall our competitive numbers continue to fall with subsequent loss of parental personnel available to fill the club office positions and volunteer hungry needs of running competitive meets to FINA requirements. This means fewer people are working

harder just to maintain what we have presently, and this is impacting on Club and Region to operate effectively.

I would like to see each club at this time every year submit the club's plans for the following year and the strategies in place to fulfil their goals. I am envisaging a single page document the Swimming BOP Liaison Officer can use as a check list to help clubs, and at the end of the season determine how and if the goals were met. The clubs could do this at their first meeting of the new committee and could request the Liaison Officer to be present if they desired. A template could be drawn up if clubs think this would be useful.

Adequate pool space at affordable rates must be a club priority. Clubs need to be pro-active in forging positive relationships with pool providers. Councils are under pressure from many aquatic groups for lane space and clubs must guard their lane space vigilantly. Dialogue with providers must be ongoing so there is always good understanding of the nature of our sport as personnel in pools change. Swimming BOP is willing to attend meetings with club to negotiate with providers.

Membership is the linchpin of club survival. Clubs need regular activities which attract new members. Club nights, race days, fun mini meets, should be an integral part of the club programme and open to all comers and advertised at pools, LTS classes, schools and surf clubs. Clubs must offer different types of membership to cater for all member groups. Clubs which have done this are reaping the benefits. Every opportunity has to be taken to sign up new swimmers.

Congratulations to Swim Rotorua in successfully merging two clubs. They are now one of our largest clubs and showing a good increase in numbers. They have put in policies make swimming a positive and challenging experience for their athletes to keep them in the sport throughout their teenage years .

I also believe it would be advantageous to us to forge close ties with other aquatic sports such as Surf Lifesaving and water polo. Most of their top athletes have been, or are, swim squad members. Some already recognise the benefits of continued squad training for their members and run their own squad programmes. It would be far better to leave that to swim clubs with the expertise in swimming and concentrate on the other aspects of their sport. As well as producing better competitors for them, it would create flows to and from both sports, larger squads of older swimmers and larger social groups....very important for teenagers and young adults.

Lastly, I wish to thank all the people I have been associated with in my many years in swimming. I have had lots of good times and made many friends. It is still a joy to watch a young swimmer progress through the grades gaining confidence and skills that are life lasting.

CLUB LIAISON OFFICER

Technical Officials Report

Congratulations to those officials who gained technical qualifications in the past year. The new Assessment system which has replaced "exams" is starting to take effect. This involves oral questions (standardised throughout NZ) and assessment of practical competence by our panel of Assessors. The emphasis will be on getting people to try out new duties and encouraging them to gain additional qualifications. The standardisation resulted from a SNZ Officials Forum held in Wellington in September 2009 which was attended by Ann Benseman and myself.

Information relevant to the duties of various officials is available on the Swimming NZ web site under the heading of "Competitions/Technical Information". There are two documents which can be

downloaded and consulted - " SNZ Technical Officials Guide" and "FINA Rules 2009-2013". Also on that web site are "Disqualification Wording Cards", "FINA Rules - card size" and "Disqualification Forms". Copies of these documents should be held by all IOTs, Starters and Referees.

A Technical Officials seminar was held at Rotorua in November 2009. This was designed as a refresher for existing officials and was attended by about 25 people. The FINA DVD was shown and discussed. This DVD is a valuable resource and all clubs should have a copy available for viewing by their officials. If any club or official does not have access to a copy of this DVD they should contact a member of the Technical or Officials Appointments Committees. At this seminar it was announced that there would not be any future assessment for Timekeeper qualification. The BOP Technical Committee has since reviewed this matter and decided that as they view timekeeping as a very important foundation for further qualifications, Timekeeper assessments would continue.

Most clubs still do not appear to have appointed an official's coordinator to provide the names of officials available for the various meets. If clubs do not provide sufficient officials then swimmers from that club may be excluded from the relevant meet.

As in past years, several of our nationally qualified officials participated in the various National Championships around New Zealand. Congratulations to Ann Benseman who was presented with the Swimming NZ Technical Official of the Year Award at the recent SNZ Awards Evening. Ann has been appointed to officiate at the Open Water World Championships in Canada and at the Oceania Open Water Meet in Samoa.

I would like to thank the Swim Committee and the members of the Technical Committee for helping to organise meets and officials during the year. Special thanks and congratulations to our Patron, Enid Wordsworth, whose dedication to swimming has resulted in her being made a Life Member of Swimming NZ - a great and deserved honour indeed.

Thank you to all officials, both local and from other Regions. We hope that the involvement is enjoyable and rewarding, and look forward to seeing continued input in the future.

Treasurer's Report

REVIEW

As anticipated, the 2009/10 financial year closed with a net surplus income of \$3000. It must be noted that this result was largely due to the expertise of our dedicated swim committee and that no funding was received by way of grants.

Events conducted by the region remain our primary source of revenue. Thanks to the swim committee our local regional events were very, very successful. The winter Short-Course Championships, Junior Long-Course Championships, Ribbon Meet and Rising Stars are the stand-out events which bank-roll the region's operations. Income from local events was up \$2,923 on the previous year, while expenses were \$2,393 less than before.

Customary deficits were incurred with national events, awards, education activities and administration. By the time these accounts went to audit we had had no indication of any revenue accruing from 3-Regions Championships.

Although administration expenses were \$2,049 less than the prior year, there was \$5,802 less administration income. Interest earned on deposits was down by \$1613.

The Statement of Position in the annual accounts illustrates Swimming Bay of Plenty's secure base.

The war chest grew to \$88,000 and remains invested in bank short-term deposits. We have also endeavoured to hold much of our operating funds in an interest earning on-call deposit.

SBOP's sound financial position is testimony to sensible, progressive regional management.

It's appropriate to again acknowledge the generous sponsorship received from Young Read Woudberg Ltd of Tauranga; the chartered accountants who audited our annual accounts, then donated their fee back to us. We are very fortunate, a *pro bono* auditor is now quite uncommon.

OUTLOOK

A year ago I estimated a likely surplus of about \$3,000 for 09-10; maybe I can forecast a much higher surplus for 2010-11. We expect a similar result from local events but since we are to host some national fixtures, we do expect to show a surplus for all events this time.

However, will the anticipated additional profits be negated by greater expenditure on educational activities? Perhaps an overall surplus of \$5,000 is likely.

This year's 6% decline in registrations of competitive swimmers was largely due to difficulties experienced by one of our clubs. Hopefully that will be reversed this season. Financial viability has become so reliant on large attendances at regional meets that growth in competitive membership is central to future success.
